DESTINATIONS OF 2016 YEAR 12 COMPLETERS

Aspley Special School



Introduction

This page presents a summary of results of the annual *Next Step* survey for Aspley Special School. The *Next Step* survey, undertaken by the Queensland Government, targets all students who completed Year 12 and gained a Senior Statement in 2016, whether they attended a state, Catholic or independent school, or a TAFE secondary college. The Queensland Government Statistician’s Office conducted the survey between March and June 2017, approximately six months after the young people left school. Responses were collected online and via computer-assisted telephone interviewing.

Response rate for Aspley Special School

Table 1 below reports the response rate for Aspley Special School. It expresses the number of respondents from this school, as a percentage of all Year 12 completers who attended Aspley Special School in 2016. It has not been possible to ascertain how representative these responses are of all Year 12 completers from this school.

Definitions of post-school pathways

The post-school pathways of Year 12 completers from special schools were categorised into eight main destinations. Year 12 completers from special schools who were in education, training or employment as well as attending a day service were reported in their education, training or employment pathway. A table defining these pathways is shown in Table 2.

Summary of findings

In 2017, thirteen young people who completed Year 12 at Aspley Special School in 2016 continued in a meaningful post-school pathway in the year after they left school.

Three young people were undertaking post-school education and training in campus-based study. Work was a pathway for four respondents either in supported employment (one) or undertaking unpaid or volunteer work (three). A further six respondents were attending a day service.

Two respondents did not enter a meaningful post-school pathway and were not in the labour force, education or training.

Figure 1: Post-school pathway of Year 12 completers, Aspley Special School 2017

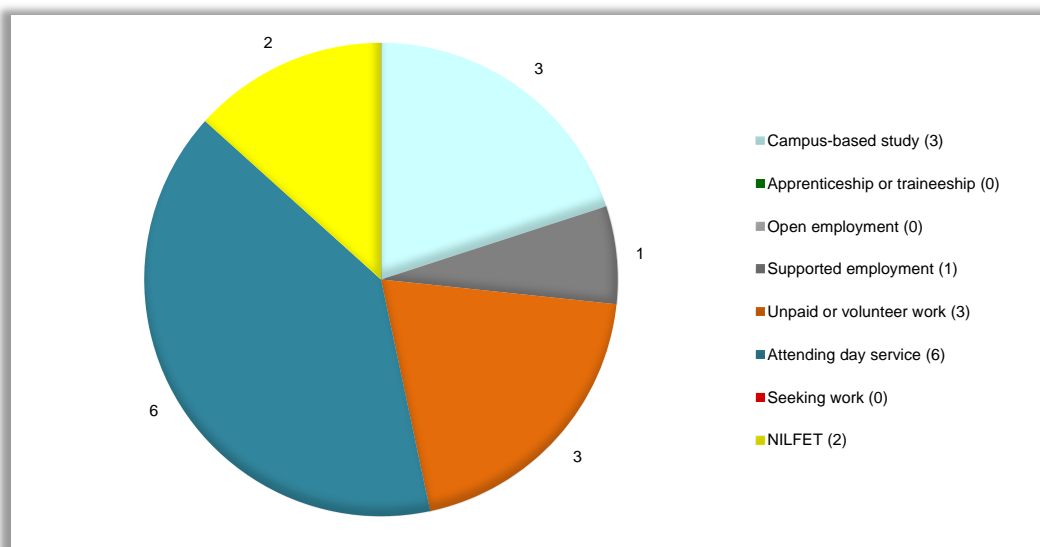


Table 2: Post-school pathway categorisation

Education and Training	
Campus-based study^{a,b}	Studying at Certificate I, II, III, IV, Diploma, Advanced Diploma, Associate Degree or Bachelor Degree level (excluding apprentices and trainees).
Apprenticeship or traineeship^b	Employment-based apprenticeship or traineeship.
Employment	
Open employment^b	Undertaking full or part-time work in a non-supported employment environment and not in an education or training destination.
Supported employment^b	Undertaking full or part-time work in a supported employment environment and not in an education or training category.
Unpaid or volunteer work^b	Undertaking unpaid work—including vocational placements, internships, work experience and trials—or volunteer work.
Attending day service	
Attending day service	Attending a day service one or more days per week and not in an education, training or employment category.
Seeking work or Not in the Labour Force, Education or Training	
Seeking work	Looking for work and not in an education or training destination.
NILFET	Not in education or training, not working and not seeking work.
